GENERAL RULES FOR OPEN CLASS ENTRY

Entry Form at end of booklet

1. **Entries due July 15th 2024 No exceptions!** There will be no additional entries made at the fair on entry day. Entries may be deleted, but not added. **NOTE: Use extreme care in filling out your entry form. A wrong number or class letter may result in the exhibit not being judged.**
2. Exhibitors are encouraged to use the online entry process through the fair website to create further efficiencies.
3. Entry fees are \$30.00 for the first 25 items and \$10.00 for each additional 25 items. The \$30.00 fee includes a season ticket. Please make checks payable to Waupaca County Fair.
4. Nursing home or institutional-care residents may enter for a fee of \$5.00. This fee does not include a season pass. Make checks payable to Waupaca County Fair.
5. Just Starting' is open to youth under 15 who are not enrolled in an organized youth organization recognized by the Waupaca County Fair. Entry fee is \$5.00 and does not include a season pass.
6. Entries may be in "Just Starting" classes only.
7. No tags will be given until the entry fees are paid.
8. On Wednesday of fair week, the tags will be available in the Open Class Building for pick up.
9. Original entry forms will be kept at the fairgrounds during the fair. Errors on tags may only be corrected by the Exhibitor Committee and will only be done if it was a result of an incorrect entry made by the Exhibitor Committee. No additions or substitutions may be made after the entry deadline.
10. **ENTRY DAY — WEDNESDAY OF FAIR:** All Open Class exhibits (unless otherwise noted) must be entered / taken to the proper department between 12 noon to 7:00 p.m. Livestock must be entered between 6:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Horses must be entered between 9:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. Goats: All market goats must be weighed at official scale and checked in by 3:00 p.m. on entry day. Rabbits and Poultry must be in the barn by 8 p.m. Non livestock exhibits and non-flower exhibits may be brought to the open class building, by car or truck, on Tuesday from 12:00 pm till 7:00 p.m. These exhibits are only being dropped off and will still need to be checked in on Wednesday.
11. **Bring Flowers (Dept. 15.) to the fair on Friday. The open class building will be open for flower entries from 8:00 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. on FRIDAY. Judging will begin at 1:00pm.**
12. **RELEASE TIMES SUNDAY:** All Open Class Livestock exhibits will be released at 4:00 p.m. Barn exhibits are not to be taken down before 4:00 p.m. All Open Class Building exhibits will be released at 6:00 p.m. All exhibits must be picked up from the Open Class building by 7:30 p.m. when the building closes. **No exhibit may be removed early.** Release times can be subject to change due to an enacted emergency action plan.
13. **All items entered to be made, grown, or created after the previous fair (unless otherwise noted).**
14. No soiled or unfinished work will be accepted.
15. Only one premium may be won by an individual in competition for each prize; i.e., **an exhibitor cannot enter two exhibits in the same lot.** No animal or article shall be entered in competition for more than one premium.
16. **All animal exhibits are subject to Jr. Fair Animal Rules unless otherwise noted. This includes the maximum number of animals.**
17. Waupaca County Fair and representatives are not responsible for lost, broken, or damaged items.
18. Those participating in the Waupaca County Open Class may request reasonable accommodations for disabilities by contacting the Waupaca County Fair Office at 715-281-3822, PO Box 713, Weyauwega, WI 54983 in advance of the fair. At least one month in advance is suggested. The participant will be contacted as soon as possible to discuss the request for accommodation and the appropriate county fair officials will be notified of accommodations that have been approved.
19. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and show management, or other show officials, shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
20. Fair participants cannot show the same exhibit at more than one county fair.
21. Exhibitors must show their own animal at the fair except for extreme circumstances (i.e., medical, death in family or military service).
22. Each exhibitor bears the responsibility of seeing that exhibits shown meet all requirements. Any attempt toward misrepresentation will automatically cancel premium earned.
23. Where exhibit calls for **poster** or **chart**, the size **must** be 14"x22", unless otherwise specified. Where exhibit calls for a **display**, this is not limited to a 14"x22", unless otherwise specified. **No foam board** should be used for posters or matting of pictures in any department. Foam board for "displays" is allowed, unless otherwise specified. **For Photography, follow the rules listed in that department.**
24. If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in any open class / junior fair class, the class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal groups according to weight, age or other identifying characteristic and each group judged as a class.
25. No open class / junior fair exhibitors will be allowed to stay overnight at the fairgrounds, unless they paid for camping.
26. Shower facilities are available daily between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. only.
27. No display will be allowed that takes up animal stall space.

HELPFUL HINT

Mark each item you plan to enter right in the premium book. Then write them on the entry blank **IN THE SAME ORDER THEY ARE LISTED IN THE BOOK.** This will make it much easier for you to find the proper tags when you receive them, and help prevent errors.

OPEN/JUNIOR FAIR ANIMAL RULES

Open and Junior Fair animal exhibits are subject to all Animal Health Regulations.

1. Entry times and health paper requirements are as follows:
MARKET ANIMALS AND OTHER LIVESTOCK: All market animals must be weighed, without blankets, **RIGHT OFF THE TRUCK ON ENTRY DAY between 6:00 a.m. and 12:00 p.m.** Animal health papers for livestock exhibits must be handed in at weigh-in or check-in on entry day. **DAIRY:** All animals must be entered between 6:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. All required health papers will be checked by the Superintendents. **RABBITS & POULTRY:** Must be in the barn by 8 p.m. **HORSES:** All horses can start entering at 9:00 a.m. and must be in the barn by 7:00 p.m. **GOATS:** Goats must be weighed at official scale and/or checked in by 3:00 p.m. on entry day.
2. Premiums will be withheld from exhibitors who do not comply with the barn rules set forth for the department in which they are exhibiting. The process to enforce barn rules will be as follows:
 - a. Superintendent will corroborate with someone else (another superintendent, another parent, etc.) to assess the situation.
 - b. The exhibitor will be contacted (announce to come to the barn, call, etc.) to bring the situation to their attention.
 - c. If necessary, discuss the situation with the parent(s) and the exhibitor. If unable to reach parent(s), contact the club leader or chapter advisor.
 - d. If the verbal notice is not effective, a written warning will be given to the exhibitor with a copy to the parent(s) and a copy kept on file.
 - e. If the situation is not corrected within the time indicated in the written warning, the animals may be removed and the premium will be withheld from the exhibitor.
 - f. Update a UW-Extension and/or Fair Board Representative of the situation.
3. **Barn rules:**
 - a. The care of animals is the responsibility of the exhibitor. Animals should be fed and watered twice a day (more often if the weather demands).
 - b. Bedding should be kept dry and manure free. Remove daily as needed. All exhibitors are to dispose of manure in the designated receptacles. Morning cleanup should be completed by 10:00 a.m.
 - c. Exhibitors may not exceed a maximum of six inches for a bedding pack.
 - d. Keep aisles swept and clean. No fitting stalls allowed in any aisle in any livestock barn (outside only).
 - e. Wash areas should be cleaned after use. All hoses and equipment must be properly stored when not in use by owners.
 - f. Exhibit should reflect that it has been tended to on a regular basis each day.
 - g. **ALL** staples must be removed from **ALL** display boards in dairy, beef, swine, sheep, and goat barns.
4. Each exhibitor must show his/her own livestock in the Showmanship Classes. All showmanship entries are required to be shown by the exhibitor in another class at this year's fair (except where noted in horse and dog departments). At the discretion of the department superintendent, another exhibitor may be designated to assist in showing the animal in the other classes.
5. Junior exhibitors may compete in the Open division in livestock classes. However, they cannot compete with the same animal (beef, dairy, sheep, goats or swine) they entered in the Junior Fair department. If they enter the Open Class, they must comply with all Open Class rules and enter different animals. Likewise, livestock shown in the Junior Fair may not be shown in the Open division by a different exhibitor.
6. No premiums may be awarded for any beef cattle, sheep, goat, swine or horses of the male sex (other than those which have been castrated) exhibited in any class unless the animal is registered with a certificate of registry.
7. All animals exhibited in the registered dairy classes must be registered purebred, or identified four generation registry in each respective breed association's herd books. Animals shown in these categories must have official certificates as produced by their respective breed association and such registry certificates must be presented to the superintendent upon arrival of the animal. Holsteins must be a minimum of 87% (RHA) as indicated by their registration certificate.
8. Junior Dairy exhibitors must have initiated animal projects during the current year.
9. **Sheep:** No animal over 6 months of age with horns can be exhibited unless it is standard for that specific breed. Sheep with full natural horns may not be entered unless full natural horns are a standard for a specific breed. The eligibility of animals with scurs will be left to the discretion of the fair veterinarian. **Goats:** No goat with horns can be exhibited unless it is standard for that specific breed. The eligibility of animals with scurs will be left to the discretion of the fair veterinarian.
10. All animals brought to the fair must be for exhibit only.
11. Female animals in estrus shall be judged separately from the rest of the class they are entered in at the discretion of the superintendent. Female animals in estrus shall not be allowed in any showmanship class. **EXCEPTION:** If the exhibitors only bovine is in estrus, another junior fair exhibitor bovine may be shown for showmanship at the superintendent's discretion.
12. No forced filling of any animal of any species will be performed on the fairgrounds without veterinary supervision.
13. The fan policy states that fans will go in one direction crosswise. All fans shall be blowing to the east in the beef barn and south in the dairy barn. No butt fans. No fans will be allowed in the walkway. 24-inch maximum fan size suggested. There will be no fans of any size allowed in the sheep/hog barn. The superintendents and/or Fair Board reserve the right to determine acceptable placement and usage.
Between 5:00 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. and 7:00 pm to 10:00 pm., deliveries of animal-care needs may be made through the large animal gate (on south side). No vehicles allowed inside fairgrounds for supply delivery/animal-care needs from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.
14. **ALL CONTAMINATED MILK NOT SUITABLE FOR THE MILK TANK IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE EXHIBITOR AND MUST NOT BE DUMPED OR DISPOSED OF AT THE FAIRGROUNDS.**
15. The Waupaca County Fair Board has adopted a policy stating there shall be no euthanizing or butchering of large animals, small animals, or poultry on the grounds at the time of the Waupaca County Fair.
16. Premises ID information can be found at http://datcp.wi.gov/animals/premises_registration/index.aspx
17. Power washers at the fair, due to human and animal safety, are not allowed.
18. If any animal dies while at the fair, the animal cannot be removed from the grounds without the professionally hired fair veterinarian giving permission.

19. Animal health during the fair is overseen by the professionally hired Fair Veterinarian. Any exhibitor asked to remove an animal for health reasons must comply.
20. Clipping and grooming of exhibits while on the Fairgrounds is to be done by the exhibitor, his or her immediate family, which includes father, mother, sister, brother or (legal guardian or stepparent with proof of relationship), and/or other participating Waupaca County Fair Junior exhibitors. Managerial animals cannot be fitted by the owner unless the owner is a junior or related as stated previously (*following State Fair guidelines*). Failure to comply with this rule may result in animal disqualification, immediate exhibitor disqualification and possible future exhibitor disqualification.
21. Exhibitors in each barn are responsible for putting away the pens with the supervision of the superintendents.

HEALTH PAPERS

All health papers are required. These must be presented to the superintendents and identification must be verified before these animals can be taken into the barns. A SUPERINTENDENT WILL BE ASSIGNED TO EACH BARN FOR THIS PURPOSE. Health papers or animal forms need to match a "visible" ID, tattoo, ear tag, vaccination tag. All classes will have the same premium numbers as those listed below. Be sure to include department number, class letter, premium number and birth date of animal (mo., yr.) for your respective breed.

DAIRY CATTLE

DEPARTMENT 1

All animals must be registered/qualified animals unless noted otherwise. All animals shown as purebred must exhibit registry papers with percentage qualified according to each breed organization to meet eligibility.

Before you enter your animals, be sure you understand and comply with the health regulations. All health papers will be picked up as the animals are unloaded at the fairgrounds.

Judging of Open Class Dairy Cattle will be on Friday afternoon. Registered/Qualified animals may be entered in Classes A-F.

Must be on grounds by 5:30 p.m. Wednesday-Mouthing is done at the determination of the professionally hired fair veterinarian.

Annual: All plant material that completes full cycle within one year, seed or bulb. Would include those plant materials that can't winter-over in our area. (Glads, Cannas, Tuberoses)

Perennial: Any plant material that outdoors, will survive our Wisconsin winters and then bloom for more than one summer.

Biennial: Any plant material that, outdoors, will survive our Wisconsin winters, has vegetative growth the first year, blooms the second year and then dies.

Animal Health Regulations

Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2024 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so always check datcp.wi.gov or contact us for current information. Fairs or exhibitions may have additional requirements. Exhibitors should contact the event organizers for more information. Ref. s. ATCP 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code.

<p>General requirements for event organizers</p>	<p>All fairs or exhibitions of any length must obtain, review, and keep for five years all required records and test results:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Exhibitor’s name and address • Animal identification (number, type, description, and, when required, official identification (see requirements for different animals below)) • Documents showing compliance with disease testing and other health requirements • Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated • Documentation showing legal importation to the event (if applicable) and, when required, movement to the event (see requirements for different animals below) • For swine, a record of any swine transported directly to a slaughtering establishment • For swine, a record of any swine transported to an animal market where all animals sold at the market sale for that day were shipped directly to a slaughtering establishment <p>Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily.</p> <p>Note: Except in specific circumstances, if an animal already bears an official 840 eartag, that eartag must not be removed and additional official eartags must not be applied. Instead, the existing eartag must be read and recorded when a record of that animal is required. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.045, Wis. Admin. Code)</p> <p>These regulations apply to all fairs and exhibitions, including additional events (like rodeos, shows, or other organized events) that occur in conjunction with the fair.</p>
<p>Diseases</p>	<p>Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition. Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.08(1), Wis. Admin. Code)</p> <p>Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.</p>

Cattle and bison

Cattle from within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents.

Cattle from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.22, Wis. Admin. Code) must:

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a documenting official animal identification (ID) and all required tests and certifications
- Have official individual ID (including steers)^b
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/CattleBison.aspx)

Acceptable animal IDs^b for all cattle from outside Wisconsin

- USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag); this includes the orange brucellosis vaccination tag
- 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID)
- Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015:
 - o Manufacturer-coded RFID tag - 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s
 - o American ID tag – 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA"

Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

No cattle from outside Wisconsin are currently required to be brucellosis tested or vaccinated to come to fairs and shows in Wisconsin

Tuberculosis (TB) requirements^c for cattle from outside Wisconsin

As of 1/1/23, all cattle from **Texas** and **Michigan's TB Free Zone** (for cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone see below), regardless of sex or age are required to have a negative TB test within 60 days prior to import.

Cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone – Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, and Oscoda counties - (for cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need:

- Import permit^e
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older^c
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin^c
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show^d.

Swine

Note: These regulations apply to all swine, including pet pigs and racing pigs.

Swine from within Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.32(2) and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a:

Note: Herd of origin means the herd in which the pigs currently reside, likely the exhibitor's herd. When pigs are purchased from a herd, the herd from which they originate is the herd of origin for the seller. Once the purchased pigs are added into the buyer's herd (even if the buyer's herd only consists of one or just a few animals), the buyer's herd becomes the new herd of origin and that herd must meet testing requirements to move pigs again.

- Stating that the entire herd of origin on the farm was inspected within 30 days before the show and no apparent disease was present at the time of inspection^d.
- **Non-terminal Exhibitions:** All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PEDv (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the end of the exhibition^c. Include test date, type, and results on the CVI.
- **Terminal Exhibitions:** No testing requirements.^c

Note: Terminal Exhibitions are those at which all the swine go directly from the fair/show to the slaughtering establishment OR to a slaughter only market sale. If going to a slaughter only market sale, contact the Division of Animal Health fair inspector for required information to collect.

Note: If the fair intends to use a load-out facility, contact the Division of Animal Health in advance to discuss requirements that must be met.

Swine from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s. ATCP 10.30 and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a that includes the following:

- The negative results of the PRRS test^c from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- The negative results of the PEDv test^c from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- A statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no clinical signs of PRRS and PEDv or any other apparent disease was present at the time of inspection.^d
- Official individual identification (ID)^b Acceptable methods of ID for swine are^b:
 - USDA silver ear tag
 - USDA 840 ear tag, either visual or RFID
 - Breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered
 - An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
 - Ear notch if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered

Note: Microchips are not accepted as official ID for any swine including pet pigs.

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information and for PRRS and PEDv testing options, check https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/SwineMovement.aspx.

Sheep and goats

Note: These rules do not apply to non-domestic sheep and goats. See Exotic Ruminants below.

Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin need:

- If sexually intact, need official individual identification (ID)^b at any age.
- If not sexually intact, need official individual ID^b if they are 12 months or older.
- See below for Official ID options.
- Sheep and goats that go to a slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the slaughter establishment.

Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin (Ref. s.ATCP 10.69, 10.76, Wis. Admin. Code) need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)^a and official individual ID^b for all animals.
- See below for Official ID options.
- See below for additional requirements for goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis Modified Accredited Zone.
- Sheep and goats that go to a slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the slaughter establishment.

Official Identification^b includes:

- Scrapie eartags (including tags on neckstraps for animals with absent/injured ears or with official tattoos – see DATCP Website*)
- USDA 840 ear tags
- Legible breed tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Legible scrapie tattoos (see DATCP Website* and NOTE below)
- Approved microchips (Electronic Identification/EID) – There are many requirements that need to be met to use microchips including a requirement for accompanying tattoos. See DATCP Website* and NOTE below.
- **NOTE:** All sheep and goats **that go through a market or to slaughter** and require Official Identification **must be eartagged** with Official ID. Official ID in the form of a tattoo or Electronic Implantable Identification (EID) is no longer sufficient when moving through a market or going to slaughter.
- **NOTE:** If a Wisconsin origin animal is neutered, less than 12 months of age, and moving through a market after the fair, the market may require Official ID in the form of an ear tag.

Goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis (TB) Modified Accredited Zone –Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, Oscoda counties- also need:

- Import permit^e
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older^c
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin^c
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show.^d

Circus, rodeo, racing and menagerie animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

Animals from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) and vaccinations, identification, and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

They also need import permit numbers^e (Ref. s.ATCP 10.81, Wis. Admin. Code) if they are:

- Circuses and individual circus acts
- Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses
- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- Rodeo horses owned by individual participants
- Single-species groups

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Guidelines for housing and managing animals

The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for Johne's disease by ELISA test, and bring to shows only if negative test
- Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used on the grounds before, during, and after the show
- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock

The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:

- House cattle separately from South American camelids and other exotic ruminants
- House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
- House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
- House swine separately from any other mammals
- Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
- Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities
- Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones

WAUPACA COUNTY FAIR REGULATIONS

Premium Regulations for State Aid are governed by the Waupaca County Fair Board in compliance with the rule set forth by Chapter ATCP. 160 Wisconsin Department of Agriculture: County and District Fairs. If there is elimination or reduction of state aid, there may be adjustments to premiums, gate passes or the addition of stall fees.

GENERAL NOTICES

NO ALCOHOL CARRY-INS ALLOWED.

For the safety of all fair attendees and fair animals there will be not be food, barbecue grills or fire pits allowed in or near the barns or youth building.

Canopies will be allowed by designated/pre-approved areas during 8:00 am -8:00 pm.

No water hoses or pressurized drinking cups will be allowed in the barn.

No smoking allowed in any enclosed structure.

SPECIAL NOTICE

To All Exhibitors and Visitors at the Waupaca County Fair

All persons are notified that the fairgrounds are county property and any individuals detected or known to have damaged locks or broken open any buildings, removed boards from the enclosure or in any other way trespassed upon or injured the property of the county, will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law (Sec. 442 W.S. 1898).

Section 4571: "Any person who shall willfully and without right enter any agricultural or industrial fairgrounds, which are duly enclosed by a fence, not less than six feet high, during any fair or exhibition, by climbing over or passing through or under such fence, or by using the ticket or badge of some other person in any way, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars." **The Fair Board reserves the right to interpret rules as needed.**

FIRE AND POLICE PROTECTION

The grounds of the Association are located about a half-mile distance from the principal fire station of the City of Weyauwega, and every precaution will be taken to prevent conflagration. A strong police and detective force will be on duty day and night to guard the interests of the exhibitors and patrons of the fair, but the Association will not assume any responsibility or pay for any losses or damage from fire, theft or violence. Exhibitors must take their own risk. Policemen will be sworn in as conservators of the peace, and it shall be their duty to arrest any person creating any disorder or violating any rules of the state.

The board of directors of the Waupaca County Fair Association will take every precautionary measure in its power for preservation of the articles and stock on exhibition. **But the Association will not be responsible for any loss that may occur!**

ADMISSION

Any vehicle that makes deliveries on the fairgrounds must leave after delivery and park in specified parking areas by 9 am. Members are not entitled to the privilege of running automobiles on or off the fairgrounds for the purpose of conveying people or supplies without paying the regular fee charged non-members. Single admission tickets will be on sale each day of the fair. Season tickets are available prior to the fair, see website waupacacountyfair.com for details. Transfer or loan of season tickets, checks or badges will be considered fraud upon the association.

INFORMATION FOR EXHIBITORS Ag. 5.04

Remember, this is your Fair, Waupaca County's Fair, and your suggestion or honest criticism will be welcomed. No premiums will be paid on any articles not listed herein. All bills and claims (exclusive of premiums) must be presented to the Secretary by October 21 following the fair. No payments will be made before that time. Please do not ask the Secretary for a check before that time. After October 21, checks will be mailed from the Secretary's office.

Labor and other accounts: The same rule will apply to other accounts payable. If, after October 21, it appears that revenue received was insufficient to make full payments on accounts due, right is reserved to make prorated payments.

All Junior Fair animal regulations apply to Open Class.

NATIONAL SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS

The Waupaca County Fair requires that all animal exhibitors comply with the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) National Show Ring Code of Ethics. All animal exhibitors, including a parent or guardian of Junior Fair exhibitors, sign the IAFE Exhibitor Entry Statement (included with the entry materials) indicating they have read and understand, consent to, and agree to abide by the following:

IAFE (International Association Of Fairs And Expositions) National Code Of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at the Waupaca County Fair shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agriculture education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all animals offered in any event at the fair.

All leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine examples. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all animal exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all animal exhibitors in competitive events:

1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any other facts relating thereto is prohibited.
2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair officials.
3. Exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fair.
4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Animals shall not be exhibited if the drug administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from the animal indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair. At any time after an animal arrives at the fair, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, icing, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.

7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.

8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action to be determined by the fair board.

9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.

10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.

11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of any penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infraction.

EXHIBITOR ENTRY STATEMENT
