# GENERAL RULES FOR OPEN CLASS ENTRY Entries done online.

- Entries due July 15<sup>th</sup> 2025 There will be no additional entries made at the fair on entry day. Entries may be deleted, but not added. Electronic entry forms will be kept at the fairgrounds during the fair. If it can be determined that a clerical error was made in processing the entry, the error will be corrected.
- 2. Entries are only based on the current year's fair book and encouraged to be made online. Entries made with prior year fair books will be returned.
- 3. Open Class Exhibitor Entry Fee of \$15.00 (up to 20 entries), \$20.00 (21-30 entries), \$25.00 (31-40 entries), \$30.00 (41-50 entries), \$35.00 (51-60 entries), \$40.00 (61-70 entries), \$45.00 (71-80 entries), \$50.00 (81-90 entries), \$55.00 (91-100 entries), \$60.00 (101+ entries) per exhibitor. This fee does not include a season pass. Payments will be collected online during the registration via Credit or Debit Card. Nursing home or institutional-care residents may enter for a fee of \$5.00.
- 4. Just Starting' is open to youth under 15 who are not enrolled in an organized youth organization recognized by the Waupaca County Fair.
- 5. Entries may be in "Just Starting" classes only.
- **6.** No tags will be given until the entry fees are paid.
- 7. All entry tags should be picked up prior to fair. Entry tags will be available on August 9<sup>th</sup> at the Cat & Small Pet Show at the fair grounds. Entry tags will also be available at the Dog Show August 16<sup>th</sup> starting at 9:30. Entry tags should be on your project prior to those projects coming to the fair. ENTRY DAY WEDNESDAY OF FAIR: All Open Class Building exhibits must be entered between 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. Livestock (Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Swine, Goats) must be entered between 6:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Horses must be entered between 9:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. Rabbits and Poultry must be in the barn by 3 p.m.
- 8. Bring Flowers (Dept. 15.) to the fair on Friday. The open class building will be open for flower entries from 8:00 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. on FRIDAY. Judging will begin at 1:00pm.
- 9. RELEASE TIMES SUNDAY: All Open Class Livestock exhibits will be released at 3:00 p.m. Barn exhibits are not to be taken down before 3:00 p.m. All Open Class Building exhibits will be released at 5:00 p.m. All exhibits must be picked up from the Open Class building by 6:30 p.m. when the building closes. No exhibit may be removed early. Release times can be subject to change due to an enacted emergency action plan.
- 10. All items entered to be made, grown, or created after the previous fair (unless otherwise noted).
- 11. No soiled or unfinished work will be accepted.
- 12. Only one premium may be won by an individual in competition for each prize; i.e., an exhibitor cannot enter two exhibits in the same lot. No animal or article shall be entered in competition for more than one premium.
- 13. All animal exhibits are subject to Jr. Fair Animal Rules unless otherwise noted. This includes the maximum number of animals.
- Waupaca County Fair and representatives are not responsible for lost, broken, or damaged items.
- **15.** Those participating in the Waupaca County Open Class may request reasonable accommodations for disabilities by contacting the Waupaca County Fair Office at 715-281-3822, PO Box 713, Weyauwega, WI 54983 in advance of the fair.

- At least one month in advance is suggested. The participant will be contacted as soon as possible to discuss the request for accommodation and the appropriate county fair officials will be notified of accommodations that have been approved.
- 16. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and show management, or other show officials, shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- Exhibitors must show their own animal at the fair except for extreme circumstances (i.e., medical, death in family or military service).
- 18. Each exhibitor bears the responsibility of seeing that exhibits shown meet all requirements. Any attempt toward misrepresentation will automatically cancel premium earned.
- 19. Where exhibit calls for poster or chart, the size must be 14"x22", unless otherwise specified. Where exhibit calls for a display, this is not limited to a 14"x22", unless otherwise specified. No foam board should be used for posters or matting of pictures in any department. Foam board for "displays" is allowed, unless otherwise specified. For Photography, follow the rules listed in that department.
- 20. If 16 or more animals, items or articles are entered in any open class / junior fair class, the class may be divided into 2 or more approximately equal groups according to weight, age or other identifying characteristic and each group judged as a class.
- 21. No open class / junior fair exhibitors will be allowed to stay overnight at the fairgrounds, unless they paid for camping.
- **22.** Shower facilities are available daily between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. only.
- 23. No display will be allowed that takes up animal stall space.
- 24. Use of any recording device for the sole purpose of surveillance, monitoring or security is prohibited. If such device is found, you will be asked to remove the device from the fairgrounds. Failure to comply could result in police involvement.

# JUNIOR FAIR/OPEN CLASS ANIMAL RULES

Animal exhibits are subject to all Animal Health Regulations.

- 1. Entry times and health paper requirements are as follows:
  MARKET ANIMALS AND OTHER LIVESTOCK: All
  market animals must be weighed, without blankets, RIGHT
  OFF THE TRUCK ON ENTRY DAY between 6:00 a.m. and
  noon. Animal health papers for livestock exhibits must be
  handed in at weigh-in or check-in on entry day. All required
  health papers will be checked by the Superintendents.
  RABBITS & POULTRY: Must be in the barn by 3 p.m.
  HORSES: All horses can start entering at 9:00 a.m. and must
  be in the barn by 6:00 p.m. All animals / trailer load/
  exhibitor's need to have a completely filled out load sheet
  that includes your premise I.D. number.
- 2. Premiums may be withheld from exhibitors who do not comply with the barn rules set forth for the department in which they are exhibiting or Junior Fair Animal Rules, may forgo the ability to exhibit the following year. The process to enforce barn rules will be as follows:

- A. Superintendent will corroborate with someone else (another superintendent, another parent, etc.) to assess the situation.
- B. The exhibitor will be contacted (announce to come to the barn, call, etc.) to bring the situation to their attention.
- If necessary, discuss the situation with the parent(s) and the exhibitor. If unable to reach parent(s), contact the club leader or chapter advisor.
- D. If the verbal notice is not effective, a written warning will be given to the exhibitor with a copy to the parent(s) and a copy kept on file.
- E. Update a Fair Board Representative of the situation.
- 3. Each exhibitor must show his/her own livestock in the Showmanship Classes. All showmanship entries are required to be shown by the exhibitor in another class at this year's fair (except where noted in horse and dog departments). At the discretion of the department superintendent, another exhibitor may be designated to assist in showing the animal in the other classes.
- 4. Junior exhibitors may compete in the Open division in livestock classes. However, they cannot compete with the same animal (beef, dairy, sheep, goats or swine) they entered in the Junior Fair department. If they enter the Open Class, they must comply with all Open Class rules and enter different animals. Likewise, livestock shown in the Junior Fair may not be shown in the Open division by a different exhibitor.
- 5. No premiums may be awarded for any beef cattle, sheep, goats, swine or horses of the male sex (other than those which have been castrated) exhibited in any class unless the animal is registered with a certificate of registry.
- 6. All animals exhibited in the registered dairy classes must be registered purebred, or identified four generation registry in each respective breed association's herd books. Animals shown in these categories must have official certificates as produced by their respective breed association and such registry certificates must be presented to the superintendent upon arrival of the animal. Holsteins must be a minimum of 87% (RHA) as indicated by their registration certificate.
- 7. Junior Dairy exhibitors must have initiated animal projects during the current year.
- 8. Sheep: No animal over 6 months of age with horns can be exhibited unless it is standard for that specific breed. Sheep with full natural horns may not be entered unless full natural horns are a standard for a specific breed. The eligibility of animals with scurs will be left to the discretion of the fair veterinarian.
- 9. All animals brought to the fair must be for exhibit only.
- 10. Female animals in estrus shall be judged separately from the rest of the class they are entered in at the discretion of the superintendent. Female animals in estrus shall not be allowed in any showmanship class. EXCEPTION: If the exhibitors only bovine is in estrus, another junior fair exhibitor bovine may be shown for showmanship at the superintendent's discretion.
- 11. No forced filling of any animal of any species will be performed on the fairgrounds without the professionally hired fair veterinarian's supervision.
- 12. No fitting stalls allowed in any aisle in any livestock barn (outside only.)
- 13. The fan policy states that fans will go in one direction crosswise. All fans shall be blowing to the east in the beef barn and south in the dairy barn. No butt fans. No fans will be allowed in the walkway. 24-inch maximum fan size suggested. There will be no fans of any size allowed in the

- sheep/hog barn. The superintendents and/or Fair Board reserve the right to determine acceptable placement and usage.
- 14. Between 5:00 a.m. and 8:30 a.m. and 7:00 pm to 10:00 pm., deliveries of animal-care needs may be made through the large animal gate (on south side). No vehicles allowed inside fairgrounds for supply delivery/animal-care needs from 9:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.
- 15. ALL CONTAMINATED MILK NOT SUITABLE FOR THE MILK TANK IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE EXHIBITOR AND MUST NOT BE DUMPED OR DISPOSED OF AT THE FAIRGROUNDS.
- 16. The Waupaca County Fair Board has adopted a policy stating there shall be no euthanizing or butchering of large animals, small animals, or poultry on the grounds at the time of the Waupaca County Fair.
- 17. Premises ID information can be found at

- Power washers at the fair, due to human and animal safety, are not allowed.
- 19. If any animal dies while at the fair, the animal cannot be removed from the grounds without the professionally hired fair veterinarian giving permission.
- 20. Animal health during the fair is overseen by the professionally hired Fair Veterinarian. All animals brought for exhibit need to remain on the fairgrounds for the duration of the fair unless excused by a fair board professionally hired fair veterinarian for health issues / reasons. Medicine administered to an animal at the fair needs to be administered by a fair board professionally hired fair veterinarian. The following individuals should be present when any animals are being sent home: Fair Veterinarian, exhibitor, parent, and a fair board exhibitor committee member. Any exhibitor asked to remove an animal for health reasons must comply.
- 21. Clipping and grooming of exhibits while on the Fairgrounds is to be done by the exhibitor, his or her immediate family, which includes father, mother, sister, brother or (legal guardian or stepparent with proof of relationship), and/or other participating Waupaca County Fair Junior exhibitors. Managerial animals cannot be fitted by the owner unless the owner is a junior or related as stated previously (following State Fair guidelines). Failure to comply with this rule may result in animal disqualification, immediate exhibitor disqualification and possible future exhibitor disqualification.
- 22. Exhibitors in each barn are responsible for putting away the pens with the supervision of the superintendents.
- 23. All youth organizations must complete their barn displays /decorations as one chapter/club per species in barn. Organizations not following this will not be eligible for herdsman award in that barn.
- 24. Signing up for showmanship is a mandatory expectation for our exhibitors. Failure to participate in showmanship may remove your eligibility to show in other animal classes.
- 25. Animals that are bleeding will not be allowed in the show
- 26. Exhibitors of animals that test positive for/with a foreign or illegal substance in your animal you and or your family will be subject to a ban, up to five fair years, from showing at the Waupaca County Fair. Once your ban has been served, you may be subject to your future /family's animals being tested immediately after leaving the show ring at your expense. Your animal will be tested by the professionally hired fair veterinarian and you and the fair board may or may not be present.

#### **HEALTH PAPERS**

All health papers are required. These must be presented to the superintendents and identification must be verified before these animals can be taken into the barns. A SUPERINTENDENT WILL BE ASSIGNED TO EACH BARN FOR THIS PURPOSE. Health papers or animal forms need to match a "visible" ID, tattoo, ear tag, vaccination tag. All classes will have the same premium numbers as those listed below. Be sure to include department number, class letter, premium number and birth date of animal (mo. & yr.) for your respective breed.

# SHOW RULES

(Dairy, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Horses, Poultry and

All animals are subject to examination prior to, during and after judging by livestock superintendents, judges, fair board members or a professionally hired fair veterinarian. The Waupaca County Fair follows the IAFE Show Ring Code of Ethics and requires each exhibitor to uphold these ethics at all times.

Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and show management, or other show officials, shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect, and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action which could include forfeit of premiums for the current year and future eligibility of showing at the Waupaca County Fair for the exhibitor and/or family.

If the Waupaca County Fair Board suspects a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics and/or published rule in the current fair book has or will happen and the violation is reasonably well established before the animal is shown, the Waupaca County Fair Board will discuss the potential violation and possible actions with the exhibitor. If, at the exhibitor's discretion, the animal in question is not shown, no violation will have occurred. If the exhibitor wishes to challenge the decision that a violation will or has occurred, the exhibitor will have the opportunity to discuss this with the Waupaca County Fair Board in a review discussion. If the decision is made that a violation will or has occurred the exhibitor will be denied the opportunity to exhibit the animal in question.

If the Waupaca County Fair Board suspects a violation of the Show Ring Code of Ethics and/or published rule in the current fair book has occurred on an animal that has already been shown, the Waupaca County Fair Board will notify the exhibitor of the violation and arrange for a in person meeting in the fair office. Exhibitors found to have violated the Show Ring Code of Ethics and/or a published rule in the current fair book are subject to one or a combination of the following:

- Forfeiture or return of premium for current year.
- Written letter of reprimand to the owner, exhibitor, fitter or responsible person.
- Disqualification of the exhibition livestock from an exhibition.
- Disqualification of the exhibitor from the fair, current year or future years.

E. Publication of offense (open records review). Exhibitors of animals that test positive for/with a foreign or illegal substance in your animal – you and or your family will be subject to a ban, up to five fair years, from showing at the Waupaca County Fair. Once the ban has been served, you may be subject to your future /family's animals being tested immediately after leaving the show ring at your expense. Your animal will be tested by the professionally hired fair veterinarian and you and the fair poard may or may not be present.

# DEPARTMENT 1

All animals must be registered/qualified animals unless noted otherwise. All animals shown as purebred must exhibit registry papers with percentage qualified according to each breed organization to meet eligibility.

Before you enter your animals, be sure you understand and comply with the health regulations. All health papers will be picked up as the animals are unloaded at the fairgrounds. Judging of Open Class Dairy Cattle will be on Friday afternoon. Registered/Qualified animals may be entered in Classes A-F.

- B. All animals must be weighed as soon as they unload from the truck on entry day. Animals arriving at the fair should be reasonably clean. The weigh-in committee or superintendents should not have to handle dirty animals.
- C. Weight classes will be determined after 3:00 p.m. on entry day. Suggested minimum weight is 900 pounds. A market steer or heifer shall be at least 17 weeks old. Maximum age of 20 months. Animal must be born on or after January 1 of year preceding exhibit year.

# Animal Health Regulations Fairs and Shows in Wisconsin: 2025 Season

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so always check **datcp.wi.gov** or contact us for current information. Fairs or exhibitions may have their own additional requirements. Exhibitors should contact the event organizers for more information. Ref. s. ATCP 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code.

# General requirements for event organizers

**All fairs or exhibitions of any length** must obtain, review, and keep for five years all required records and test results:

- Exhibitor's name and address
- Animal identification (number, type, description, and, when required, official identification (see requirements for different animals below))
- Documents showing compliance with disease testing and other health requirements
- Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated
- Documentation showing legal importation to the event (if applicable) and, when required, movement to the event (see requirements for different animals below)
- For swine, a record of any swine transported directly to a slaughtering establishment
- For swine, a record of any swine transported to an animal market where all animals sold at the market sale for that day were shipped directly to a slaughtering establishment

Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all animals daily.

**Note:** Except in specific circumstances, if an animal already bears an official 840 eartag, that eartag must not be removed and additional official eartags must not be applied. Instead, the existing eartag must be read and recorded when a record of that animal is required. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.045, Wis. Admin. Code)

**These regulations apply** to all fairs and exhibitions, including additional events (like rodeos, shows, or other organized events) that occur in conjunction with the fair.

# **Diseases**

# **Lactating Dairy Cattle:**

Effective April 29, 2024 and June 19, 2024 respectively, all lactating dairy cattle moved interstate and lactating dairy cattle moved to fairs, shows, and exhibitions in Wisconsin are required to have a negative influenza A test from a milk sample collected within 7 days of movement. For more information see: <a href="DATCP Home Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza">DATCP Home Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza</a> (H5N1) in Dairy Cattle (wi.gov)

Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may not be commingled (or housed/kept) with other animals at a fair, show, or other exhibition in such a way as to allow disease to spread. Such animals should not attend the fair, show, or exhibition. Animals may be denied entry if they arrive at these events with contagious or infectious diseases, isolated and/or removed if they develop disease after arriving, or be subject to other action as would be necessary to control disease. (Ref. s. ATCP 10.08(1), Wis. Admin. Code)

**Bovine animals with ringworm, mange, warts or scab** will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds warts or ringworm lesions are incapable of transmitting disease.

# Cattle and bison

**Cattle and bison FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN:** Effective June 19, 2024, all lactating dairy cattle are required to have a negative Influenza A test<sup>c</sup> on milk samples collected within 7 days prior to movement to a fair or exhibition. Official ID is required for influenza testing.

Cattle and bison FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s. ATCP 10.22, Wis. Admin. Code) must:

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)<sup>a</sup> documenting official animal identification (ID) and all required tests and certifications
- Have official individual ID (including steers)<sup>b</sup>
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see below and https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs Services/CattleBison.aspx)

# Acceptable official IDsb for cattle and bison

- 15-digit "840" RFID tags
- Valid only if applied before November 5, 2024:
- Visual only 15 digit "840" tags
- USDA metal ear tag number that starts with the state 2 digit code and is followed by 3 letters and 4 numbers (e.g. 35ABC1234). This includes the orange brucellosis vaccination tag.
- Valid only if applied before March 11, 2015:
- Manufacturer-coded RFID tag 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s
- American ID tag 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA"

# Influenza A requirements<sup>c</sup> for lactating dairy cattle from outside Wisconsin

Effective April 29, 2024, all lactating dairy cattle are required to have a negative Influenza A test on milk samples collected within 7 days prior to interstate movement.

# Brucellosis requirements for cattle and bison from outside Wisconsin

No cattle are currently required to be brucellosis tested or vaccinated for fairs/shows in Wisconsin.

#### Tuberculosis (TB) requirements<sup>c</sup> for cattle and bison from outside Wisconsin

All cattle from **Texas** and **Michigan's TB Free Zone** (for cattle from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone see below), regardless of sex or age are required to have a negative TB test within 60 days prior to import. For details and requirements by state, see: <a href="https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs">https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs</a> Services/CattleBison.aspx

# Cattle and bison from Michigan's Modified Accredited Zone – Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, and Oscoda counties - (for cattle and bison from Michigan's TB Free Zone, see requirements by state above) also need:

- Import permite
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older<sup>c</sup>
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin<sup>c</sup>
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show<sup>d</sup>.

**Cattle and bison from Canada** must meet current federal requirements to enter the United States and may have additional requirements to return to Canada. See <a href="aphis.usda.gov">aphis.usda.gov</a>, choose "Trade", Live Animal Import or Export as needed, and then species and country to find requirements.

## Swine

**Note:** These regulations apply to all swine, including pet pigs and racing pigs.

**Note:** Herd of origin means the herd in which the pigs currently reside, likely the exhibitor's herd. When pigs are purchased from a herd, the herd from which they originate is the herd of origin for the seller. Once the purchased pigs are added into the buyer's herd (even if the buyer's herd only consists of one or just a few animals), the buyer's herd becomes the new herd of origin and that herd must meet testing requirements to move pigs again.

**Swine FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN** (Ref. s. ATCP 10.32(2) and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a Wisconsin intrastate certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)<sup>a</sup>:

- Stating that the entire herd of origin on the farm was inspected within 30 days before the show and no apparent disease was present at the time of inspection<sup>d</sup>.
- **Non-terminal Exhibitions:** All swine must have a PRRS (Porcine Reproductive and Respiratory Syndrome) and PEDv (Porcine Epidemic Diarrhea virus) test of the herd of origin within 90 days of the end of the exhibition<sup>c</sup>. Include test date, type, and results on the CVI.
- Terminal Exhibitions: No testing requirements.<sup>c</sup>

**Note:** Terminal Exhibitions are those at which all the swine go directly from the fair/show to the slaughtering establishment OR to a slaughter only market sale. Shows or exhibitions are either terminal or non-terminal. If all of the pigs at the event are not going directly to slaughter (including through a slaughter only market sale), it is considered a non-terminal exhibition. For non-terminal exhibitions, all the pigs at the show or exhibition will need to be tested prior to the event even if individual animals will go directly to slaughter. If going to a slaughter only market sale, contact the Division of Animal Health fair inspector for required information to collect.

**Note:** If the fair intends to use a load-out facility, contact the Division of Animal Health in advance to discuss requirements that must be met.

**Swine FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN** (Ref. s. ATCP 10.30 and 10.87, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)<sup>a</sup> that includes the following:

- The negative results of the PRRS test<sup>c</sup> from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- The negative results of the PEDv test<sup>c</sup> from the swine's herd of origin conducted within 90 days prior to movement into Wisconsin including test date, type, and results.
- A statement that the veterinarian has inspected the entire herd of origin within the past 30 days and that no clinical signs of PRRS and PEDv or any other apparent disease was present at the time of inspection.<sup>d</sup>
- Official individual identification (ID)<sup>b</sup> Acceptable methods of ID for swine are<sup>b</sup>:
- USDA silver ear tag
- USDA 840 ear tag, either visual or RFID
- Breed association tattoo if the pig is a purebred and the tattoo is registered
- An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
- Ear notch if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered

Note: Microchips are not accepted as official ID for any swine including pet pigs.

# Sheep and goats

Note: These rules do not apply to non-domestic sheep and goats. See Exotic Ruminants below.

# Sheep and goats FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN need:

- If sexually intact, need official individual identification (ID)<sup>b</sup> at any age.
- If not sexually intact, need official individual IDb if they are 12 months or older.
- See below for Official ID options.
- Sheep and goats that go to a slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the slaughter establishment.

# Sheep and goats FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s.ATCP 10.69, 10.76, Wis. Admin. Code) need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)<sup>a</sup> and official individual ID<sup>b</sup> for all animals.
- See below for Official ID options.
- See below for additional requirements for goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis Modified Accredited Zone.
- Sheep and goats that go to a slaughter establishment after the fair should have an owner hauler statement to move from the fair to the slaughter establishment.

# Official Identification<sup>b</sup> includes:

- Scrapie eartags (including tags on neckstraps for animals with absent/injured ears or with official tattoos – see DATCP Website\*)
- USDA 840 ear tags
- Legible breed tattoos (see DATCP Website\* and NOTE below)
- Legible scrapie tattoos (see DATCP Website\* and NOTE below)
- Approved microchips (Electronic Implantable Identification/EID) There are many requirements that need to be met to use microchips including a requirement for accompanying tattoos. See DATCP Website\* and NOTE below.
- NOTE: All sheep and goats that go through a market or to slaughter and require Official Identification must be eartagged with Official ID. Official ID in the form of a tattoo or Electronic Implantable Identification (EID) is no longer sufficient when moving through a market or going to slaughter.
- **NOTE:** If a Wisconsin origin animal is neutered, less than 12 months of age, and moving through a market after the fair, the market may require Official ID in the form of an ear tag.

# Goats from Michigan's Tuberculosis (TB) Modified Accredited Zone –Alcona, Alpena, Montmorency, Oscoda counties- also need:

- Import permite
- To originate from a herd that has a negative whole-herd TB test within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin that includes all animals 1 year and older<sup>c</sup>
- Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin<sup>c</sup>
- A statement indicating the animals will return directly to the state of origin after the show.<sup>d</sup>

# **Equine**

Equine animals FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN need documentation of a negative EIA (Coggins) test<sup>c</sup> done within the previous 12 months, which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip (if a reader is available). No test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams. Documentation may be:

- Official test report VS 10-11, or
- USDA-approved electronic test form, or
- Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, or
- Certificate of veterinary inspection with the test results listed

# Equine animals FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s.ATCP 10.36, Wis. Admin. Code) need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate) which clearly identifies the animal by complete description, digital photographs, or an approved microchip
- Negative EIA (Coggins) test<sup>c</sup> done within previous 12 months that is reported on the CVI
- No EIA test is needed for nursing foals accompanying negative dams

# **Equines from Minnesota** are exempt from the CVI requirement if:

- Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin
- The animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days
- Proof of a negative EIA (Coggins) test<sup>c</sup> in previous 12 months accompanies the animal

# **Poultry** and

waterfowl (Pigeons are not considere d poultry for fairs and shows)

# Poultry and waterfowl FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN need ONE of the following:

- For eggs and birds of all ages, an NPIP certificate stating the flock of origin is a US pullorum-typhoid clean and for turkeys a Mycloplasma gallisepticum clean flock or NPIP affiliate flock<sup>c</sup> or
- For eggs and birds of all ages, documentation the flock of origin is a Wisconsin Tested Flock and has tested negative for pullorum-typhoid and for turkeys Mycoplasma gallisepticum,c or • For eggs and birds of all ages, documentation the flock of origin is a Wisconsin Associate Flockc, or
- For sexually mature birds (turkeys over 6 months, all other birds over 4 months), individual tests within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band identification (ID). All birds must test negative for pullorum-typhoid, and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum. After testing there can be no change of ownership or commingling with other birds that are not part of the flock except at other shows/fairs. Eggs and sexually immature birds are not eligible for individual testing and cannot be shown unless they originate from an enrolled NPIP, NPIP affiliate, Wisconsin Tested, or Wisconsin Associate flock.

Note: Flock of origin means the flock in which the birds currently reside, likely the exhibitor's flock. Once purchased birds are added to the buyer's flock, even if the buyer's flock only consists of one or just a few birds, the buyer's flock is the flock of origin and that flock must meet NPIP or WI Tested or Associate Flock status to avoid individual bird testing for shows/fairs.

Poultry and waterfowl FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN (Ref. s.ATCP 10.42, Wis. Admin. Code) need a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)a or equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) specifically showing movement to the fair or show that states:

- For eggs and birds of all ages, they originate from a flock classified pullorum-typhoid clean and for turkeys Mycoplasma gallisepticum clean under NPIP or an equivalent program<sup>c</sup>, or
- For sexually mature birds, they have tested negative for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) within 90 daysc before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band IDb. Eggs and sexually immature birds are not eligible for individual testing and cannot be shown unless they originate from an enrolled NPIP or equivalent program flock.

Import permit number

# **Exotic** Ruminants

**Note:** Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, Old World camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope, giraffes, and non-domestic sheep and goats. In addition, please contact your county and local municipality for any restrictions.

Exotic ruminants FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN have no requirements.

**Exotic ruminants FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN** (Ref. s.ATCP 10.82, Wis. Admin. Code) must have

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)<sup>a</sup>
- Official individual identification (ID) as required for tuberculosis and brucellosis testing<sup>b</sup>
   Import permit<sup>e</sup>
- Proof written on the CVI that they meet requirements for:
  - Tuberculosis (TB) negative test required within 60 days before

entry<sup>c</sup> o Brucellosis – negative test required within 30 days before entry<sup>c</sup>

# South American camelids: Ilamas, alpacas, guanacos, vicuñas

**South American camelids FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN** have no requirements.

**South American camelids FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN** (Ref. s.ATCP 10.85, Wis. Admin. Code) must have a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)<sup>a</sup> and official individual identification (ID)<sup>b</sup>. Official ID may be:

- Approved USDA ear tag number
- Microchip number
- Breed association registration number
- Breed association tattoo

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check <a href="https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs">https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs</a> Services/LlamaAlpacaMovement.aspx.

**Note:** For animals that are part of menageries, see also rules below for menageries. Pot-bellied and miniature pigs fall under rules for swine. Dog hybrids, domestic cat hybrids, or exotic small cat species such as servals fall under rules for Exotic small animals. Native wild animals and birds, including raptors, and captive wild animals such as raccoons, opossums, and skunks fall under rules for wild animals.

**DOGS FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN** (Ref. s.95.21, Wis. Stats.) that are 5 months or older need proof of current rabies vaccination.<sup>f</sup>

CATS AND OTHER HOUSEHOLD PETS FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN have no requirements.

**DOGS AND CATS FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN** (Ref. s.ATCP 10.80, Wis. Admin. Code) that are 5 months or older need to be vaccinated against rabies<sup>f</sup> by a licensed veterinarian, and regardless of age, need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates)<sup>a</sup> stating the age of the animal and for animals 5 months and older the date of last rabies vaccination and revaccination due date.

**OTHER HOUSEHOLD PETS FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN** (Ref. s.ATCP 10.06, Wis. Admin. Code) need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates)<sup>a</sup> but have no testing or vaccination requirements.

Small animals from other nations need to meet requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (608-662-0600) and Centers for Disease Control (1-800-232-4636).

Exotic small animals (any species not covered by "small animals" above), exotic large animals, and other wild animals

**Animals FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN** do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin.<sup>f</sup>

**Animals FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN** (Ref. s.ATCP 10.84, Wis. Admin. Code) generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI or health certificate)a
- Import permit number<sup>e</sup>

**Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin.** These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. # Circus, rodeo, racing and menagerie animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

**Animals FROM WITHIN WISCONSIN** must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

**Animals FROM OUTSIDE WISCONSIN** need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs or health certificates) and vaccinations, identification, and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

They also need import permit numberse (Ref. s.ATCP 10.81, Wis. Admin. Code) if they are:

- · Circuses and individual circus acts
- Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses
- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- · Rodeo horses owned by individual participants
- Single-species groups

**Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin**. These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Some animals may require permits from the Department of Natural Resources. # Guidelines for housing and managing animals

# The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for Johne's disease by ELISA test, and bring to shows only if negative test
- Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used on the grounds before, during, and after the show
- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock

# The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:

- House cattle separately from South American camelids, exotic ruminants, and poultry
- House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
- House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
- House swine separately from any other mammals
- Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
- Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities
- Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones

# WAUPACA COUNTY FAIR REGULATIONS

Premium Regulations for State Aid are governed by the Waupaca County Fair Board in compliance with the rule set forth by Chapter ATCP. 160 Wisconsin Department of Agriculture: County and District Fairs. If there is elimination or reduction of state aid, there may be adjustments to premiums, gate passes or the addition of stall fees.

#### GENERAL NOTICES

#### NO ALCOHOL CARRY-INS ALLOWED.

For the safety of all fair attendees and fair animals there will be not be food, barbecue grills or fire pits allowed in or near the barns or youth building.

Canopies will be allowed by designated/pre-approved areas during 8:00 am -8:00 pm.

No water hoses or pressurized drinking cups will be allowed in the barn.

No smoking allowed in any enclosed structure.

#### SPECIAL NOTICE

# To All Exhibitors and Visitors at the Waupaca County Fair

All persons are notified that the fairgrounds are county property and any individuals detected or known to have damaged locks or broken open any buildings, removed boards from the enclosure or in any other way trespassed upon or injured the property of the county, will be prosecuted to the full extent of the law (Sec. 442 W.S. 1898).

Section 4571: "Any person who shall willfully and without right enter any agricultural or industrial fairgrounds, which are duly enclosed by a fence, not less than six feet high, during any fair or exhibition, by climbing over or passing through or under such fence, or by using the ticket or badge of some other person in any way, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars." **The Fair Board reserves the right to interpret rules as needed.** 

#### FIRE AND POLICE PROTECTION

The grounds of the Association are located about a half-mile distance from the principal fire station of the City of Weyauwega, and every precaution will be taken to prevent conflagration. A strong police and detective force will be on duty day and night to guard the interests of the exhibitors and patrons of the fair, but the Association will not assume any responsibility or pay for any losses or damage from fire, theft or violence. Exhibitors must take their own risk. Policemen will be sworn in as conservators of the peace, and it shall be their duty to arrest any person creating any disorder or violating any rules of the state.

The board of directors of the Waupaca County Fair Association will take every precautionary measure in its power for preservation of the articles and stock on exhibition. But the Association will not be responsible for any loss that may occur!

## ADMISSION

Any vehicle that makes deliveries on the fairgrounds must leave after delivery and park in specified parking areas by 9 am. Members are not entitled to the privilege of running automobiles on or off the fairgrounds for the purpose of conveying people or supplies without paying the regular fee charged non-members Single admission tickets will be on sale each day of the fair. Season tickets are available prior to the fair, see website waupacacountyfair.com for details. Transfer or loan of season tickets, checks or badges will be considered fraud upon the association.

# INFORMATION FOR EXHIBITORS Ag. 5.04

Remember, this is your Fair, Waupaca County's Fair, and your suggestion or honest criticism will be welcomed. No premiums will be paid on any articles not listed herein. All bills and claims (exclusive of premiums) must be presented to the Secretary by October 21 following the fair. No payments will be made before that time. Please do not ask the Secretary for a check before that time. After October 21, checks will be mailed from the Secretary's office.

**Labor and other accounts**: The same rule will apply to other accounts payable. If, after October 21, it appears that revenue received was insufficient to make full payments on accounts due, right is reserved to make prorated payments.

All Junior Fair animal regulations apply to Open Class.

# **NATIONAL SHOW RING CODE OF ETHICS**

The Waupaca County Fair requires that all animal exhibitors comply with the International Association of Fairs and Expositions (IAFE) National Show Ring Code of Ethics. All animal exhibitors, including a parent or guardian of Junior Fair exhibitors, sign the IAFE Exhibitor Entry Statement (included with the entry materials) indicating they have read and understand, consent to, and agree to abide by the following:

# IAFE (International Association Of Fairs And Expositions) National Code Of Show Ring Ethics

Exhibitors of animals at the Waupaca County Fair shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agriculture education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all animals offered in any event at the fair.

All leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine examples. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all animal exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all animal exhibitors in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any other facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair officials.
- 3. Exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the fair.
- 4. Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Animals shall not be exhibited if the drug administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from the animal indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair. At any time after an animal arrives at the fair, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian

- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, conformation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, icing, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action to be determined by the fair board.
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair against such individuals published in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of any penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infraction.
